



Congratulations to our new Commander, Jeff Hicks and his newly elected officers, Committee Chairmen, and appointees.

Membership is our priority for our organization, as of 7/30/2018 we were at 97% in our Membership, like years in the past, eventually we do go over the top in membership. The reason for that is everyone works very hard to retain and promote membership.

There are some Squadrons that are sick and tired of paying for their deadbeat members, a couple of examples:

Squadron 129, was down about 18%, that comes to about 98 members short of last years total.

It is our responsibility to remind them what a wonderful organization we are. We can then ask them if they know of anyone else that would like to join The Sons of The American Legion. We are always trying to get to that 10,000 membership mark. A goal that was almost achieved last year, we fell short by only 100 members. It is very disappointing and hard to absorb. We have been trying to do this for such a long time. We have our work cut out for us; for those squadrons who had to cut out their deadbeat members, go after them, be relentless! Get those members back and more. Lets stay the course and do a better job in retaining and promoting membership.

It would be great to get that elusive 10,000 membership for our Detachment, for our Veterans, for our 100th American Legion anniversary, and most of all our newly elected Commander, Mr. Jeff Hicks.

2018 - 2019 Detachment Commander's Project

Each year, a new Detachment Commander is elected and spearheads a Detachment Project for the benefit of veterans in the state of New Jersey. This year, Commander Hicks has agreed to work on another joint American Legion Family project along with Department Commander Ray Miller and Department President Fran Derin.

Commander Miller has selected the following items, which have been approved by the Department Executive Committee, to comprise the Department Project for Legion year 2018 - 19. The following is a synopsis of the 2018 -19 Department and Detachment project:

1) \$25,000 - Tom Kennedy Hoboken Post #107 (6 Homeless Veterans Bedrooms)

2) \$25,000 - DMAVA (EMERGENCY TRANSPORTATION OF VETERANS)

3) \$16,000 - VETERANS HAVEN NORTH (CAFETERIA AND MEETING ROOM FURNITURE)

4) \$30,000 - VETERANS HAVEN SOUTH (15 PASSENGER VAN)

5) \$16,000 - Brigadier General Doyle Cemetary (Renovation of Chapel Restrooms) THE TOTAL ESTIMATED COSTS ARE \$112,000.

Commander Hicks has set a goal of \$25,000 towards the overall project. The Detachment is respectfully asking for your support. Please consider a donation to help complete this very reachable goal for a very worthy endeavour.

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POW - MIA

The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) announced on Nov. 1st that a U.S. serviceman, accounted-for from World War II, was being returned to his family for burial with full military honors.

Army Staff Sqt. Karl R. Loesche, 22, of Monroeville, New Jersey, accounted for on Sept. 13, 2018, will be buried November 17 in Elmer, New Jersey. On Dec. 8, 1941, Loesche was a member of the 3rd Pursuit Squadron, 24th Pursuit Group, when Japanese forces invaded the Philippine Islands. Intense fighting continued until the surrender of Bataan on April 9, 1942, and of Corregidor on May 6, 1942.

Thousands of U.S. and Filipino service members were taken prisoner; including many who were forced to endure the Bataan Death March, en route to Japanese prisoner of war (POW) camps, including the POW camp at Cabanatuan on the island of Luzon. Loesche was among those reported captured after the surrender of Corregidor and who were eventually moved to the Cabanatuan POW camp. More than 2,500 POWs perished in this camp during the remaining years of the war.

According to prisoner records, Loesche died on Nov. 16, 1942, and was buried along with fellow prisoners in the Cabanatuan POW camp cemetery.

Following the war, American Graves Registration Service (AGRS) personnel exhumed those buried at the Cabanatuan cemetery and relocated the remains to a temporary U.S. military cemetery near Manila. In December 1946, AGRS again exhumed the remains at the Manila cemetery in an attempt to identify them. Due to the circumstances of the POW deaths and burials, the extensive commingling, and the limited identification technologies of the time, all of the remains could not be individually identified. One set of remains, designated X-882, was reburied as an Unknown in the present-day Manila American Cemetery and Memorial.

On Nov. 2, 2016, after thorough historical and scientific analysis, X-882 was disinterred from the Manila American Cemetery and Memorial. The remains were subsequently sent to DPAA for identification.

To identify Loesche's remains, scientists from DPAA and the Armed Forces Medical Examiner System used mitochondrial DNA (mtDNA) analysis, anthropological analysis, as well as circumstantial and material evidence.

DPAA is grateful to the American Battle Monuments Commission for their partnership in this mission.

Of the 16 million Americans who served in World War II, more than 400,000 died during the war. Currently there are 72,784 service members (approximately 26,000 are assessed as

possibly-recoverable) still unaccounted for from World War II. Loesche's name is recorded on the Walls of the Missing at the Manila American Cemetery, an ABMC site along with the other MIAs from WWII. Although interred as an "unknown" in Manilla American Cemetery, Loesche's grave was meticulously cared for over the past 70 years by the American Battle Monuments Commission. A rosette will be placed next to his name to indicate he has been accounted for.

One of the most articulated concerns throughout the state is the need for more of our younger veterans to join our posts. My opinion about why this is happening is that the image of what an

American Legion building hosts to the average person isn't one that is very flattering. If you ask people that aren't Legion Family members what goes on in our posts you'll find that most assume it's just a place where a bunch of old veterans drink around a bar sharing war stories. This perception needs to change.

Most of our younger veterans returning home from duty who have a partner or family aren't familiar with what we're about so there's no incentive for their coming into our posts. Our goal should be to make the image of our organization a more family-oriented one and show that we do a variety of activities for the betterment of our community, state and nation.

We can accomplish this goal in a variety of ways. My favorite is the placing of a swing set by the post if the property is there to do so. Based on accessible areas, games such as horse-shoes, a small half-field for t-ball or soccer, a basketball hoop, etc. can be utilized to draw younger veterans and their families in. If your post's insurance doesn't cover everything which occurs on your grounds, an investment in some indoor games can be pursued.

I believe posts should have a sign board where activities that go on in the post can be advertised to the community. One American Legion Post Commander I spoke with firmly believes in this and his post sign is constantly changing to reflect the activities that go on in his post.

We can also look at our buildings and grounds and spruce things up a bit. Painting a building, pulling weeds, and ensuring that handicapped accessible areas are kept up are just a few ideas to make our posts more attractive and also show to our communities that "something" is going on.

The addition of younger veterans in our posts would also help our squadrons grow as they would bring in their friends as well.

As The Sons of The American Legion, we can help our parent organization grow. Remember...

We help serve those who served. This is just my opinion.

The Detachment of NJ sent two delegates to American Legion Jersey Boys State (ALJBS) this year as recipients of the William H. Breen Memorial Boys State Scholarship. This year, Morris and Ocean Counties were represented. Let's learn a little about them: Our first delegate, Anish Balamurali, hails from Parsippany,

Morris County, and attends Parsippany High School and was originally recruited by Post 249 also from Parsippany, Morris County. His hobbies include music, art, and athletics. Outside of school, he plays piano and has attended two competitions. He plays clarinet for his high school's marching band. His school sports include swimming in the winter and tennis in the spring. He has aspirations to enter the medical field in the discipline of neuroscience.

In years past, the site has been more of a static bulletin board for announcements about upcoming meetings and committee reports. These days, websites need to be as interactive to their members as possible. This is what the Committee has been striving to turn the site into.

To that end, the Committee is happy to welcome Tony Clappsy as a consultant on developing the user interfaces for the website. He will be tasked with giving valuable input regarding the interfaces for both the public-facing and administrative sides of the website. Carl will continue as the main developer, using input from Tony to allow the site to become more functional, and less difficult to use. Usability and less need to "contact the administrator" are the goals that we are striving for.

As it stands right now, there are interactive elements to the Detachment website, (but most of the interactivity from the site has been implemented in the back-end,) where the officers and chairmen log in to update their online reports. Also, the amount of useful information was relatively limited.

In this world of smartphones and high-speed Internet, people are used to gett-ng a lot of information with relatively little effort from a glance at their phone. The Detachment Android App was a step in the right direction, though it is essentially a "second screen" to the Detachment website, with only a small amount of information available to be displayed. The current features of the site limits its usefulness to the officers as well as to the regular members. What the members need is more information about what is going on within the Detachment- squadron and county membership, events, officer and chairman contact information- all in an easy to get to manner, as well as the ability to inform the officers that work within the Detachment to serve the Detachment of New Jersey Internet Committee.

Sites like Facebook and Twitter have a home screen "stream" or "dashboard". We have begun implementing features such as these.

Current Detachment Site Some of the Planned Updates

The Internet Committee's roadmap recently underwent an update to codify the new direction that the committee is taking with the site within the past year. With some new development tools at our disposal, the work is able to progress more quickly than it had in the past, where every feature had to be built from scratch. With the use of these new development tools and various open-source projects, it was necessary to adjust the roadmap to accommodate the use of these features at the expense of some time by rebuilding the base website in a new framework.

When the reward is that much greater and the maintenance workload is more reduced, it iust makes sense.

Responsive design and reactive components are now the main building blocks for the site. Instead of one-shotting a new feature, they can be built with reuse in mind. This makes it easier to place the same information in multiple locations with less effort than previously.

Remaining issues with the Detachment website mostly remain with the contributions from the sitting officers and chairmen. Officers and chairmen tend to not provide useful information. Some leave the same information up for the entire year, without much change.

It is up to the officers and chairmen of this Detachment to make the site useful to our membership – to keep the information fresh and useful. Without this, there is little use for the site, and therefore, the committee has been spinning their wheels for the time they are holding office.

While updated pictures, layouts and functionality will keep the site fresh to a degree, the information needs to be consistently updated by the officers and chairmen. They need to roll such responsibilities into their regular schedule. If you can take the time to update your status on a social media site, you can do the same to keep the membership informed of what's going on with your office.

Never Forget

Beirut International Airport Marine Barracks Bombing



On October 23, 1983 at 6:22 am, a large delivery truck drove to the Beirut International Airport where the Marine Barracks was located. After turning onto an access road leading to the compound, the driver

rushed through a barbed-wire fence, passed between two (2) sentry posts, crashed trhough a gate, finally crashing into the loby of the barrack.

The driver detonated explosives with the power equal to more than 12,000 lbs of TNT. The explosion crumbled the four story building, crushing service men to death while they were sleeping.

This act of terrorism killed 220 Marines and 21 other U.S. service members who had been stationed there to help keep peace in a nation torn by war.

This is the bloodiest day in Corps' history since World War II, when Marines fought to secure lwo Jima.
