You may want to reach out to someone you normally wouldn't call; it could mean something special to that person as we all cope with adjusting to this new life-style. *IF* you know of someone who has the corona virus and is in need of help to get supplies, start making phone calls to members in other areas to see if they can get supplies that you can't. We are all in this together. Chaplain Nick Wingler is also available for support and concerns if you need to talk.

Although our "busy season" has been cut short with activities and events that we typically run, we still have to keep moving ahead with those activities we can still maintain.

Detachment Officers and Committee Chairmen:

Squadron Commanders:

We still have to bolster our membership, so I am also requesting all Commanders to take their list of unpaid members and give each of their Officers a portion of their list of members, along with their phone numbers, to contact. Approach those phone calls with a "buddy check" mindset—see how your member is doing and feeling. When you remind them that they need to pay their dues you could emphasize that we are still running our programs.

Detachment Vice Commanders:

Keep in constant touch with your Squadron Commanders and see if they need assistance with anything. Remind them that CSR reports are due "soon"; applications for awards such as Son of The Year, Young Citizen's Award and the Ernie Wilson, Jr. Memorial Scholarship are on-line and can be filled out and sent in. We are also still collecting donations for our programs:

Veterans: Commander's Project, VA and R and Veteran Homelessness Clothing Drive.

Children: CWF, COTA, and Special Olympics.

Remind them that they can still make donations and give them the contact information they need.

Finances:

One of my main concerns is the state of our finances. Finance Chairman Carl Albern, Jr. has worked diligently with his committee and Finance Officer Dave Page to get this straightened out. We are looking at revamping the existing allocations as well as a potential \$5.00 increase in dues, as \$3.00 is needed for National and a raise of \$2.00 for the State.

DEC

I have increased the number of DECs from 8 to 15, but not everyone has filed their paperwork. I do not see the need for me to call you since you volunteered to step up. If you are having a problem getting your signatures, contact me for assistance. Please get that paperwork into the Adjutant ASAP; your input and votes will be needed shortly. If you don't comply you are putting your own county at a disadvantage.

Looking ahead:

Not knowing where we will be in regards to health regulations and social distancing affecting upcoming Conventions, I am looking to accumulate and assess ideas for alternatives to having a physical convention for a meetings in the future. If we wind up shifting our Conventions to other dates, then we won't have to worry about this; I just want us to be prepared.

One idea I am working on is having Zoom meetings on the internet. I don't believe a conference call by telephone would work as efficiently and would be harder to manage with the amount of personnel that would be involved. I can easily set up a free chat room or look into purchasing a different kind with audio capabilities.

I welcome any and all ideas for assessment. Please email me your thoughts.

Please be safe, continue to conduct yourselves in a health-conscious manner and be patient. We will get through this.

I have met a lot of good, dedicated people from our entire American Legion Family just by going out and visiting posts and attending events throughout our counties. I'm extremely pleased at what our squadrons are doing; you should be proud of what you do as well. I want to share some of my thoughts, and progress with you; please read below:

MY PERSONAL GOALS: My main priority coming into my term was to improve our communications structure; we were only operating at a level of a little over 33% efficiency for the amount of DECs in the state. We should be at 67% once the paperwork for those that have stepped up to assume their county DEC position is filed. I am working diligently by traveling throughout the state to recruit the remainder. If you live in a county that does not have a DEC and are interested in the position, please contact me as soon as possible.

The other problem we have is that the amount of Sons of The American Legion County Executive Councils also started this year at the 33% mark. Once the DECs are in place the opportunity to form more county organizations increases as well.

DETACHMENT COMMANDER'S PROJECT: We are working in conjunction with the entire American Legion Family to improve our veteran care facilities in many ways at Paramus, Vet Haven's North, Vineland, Menlo Park and Doyle's Cemetery. The project goal is in the neighborhood of \$115,000. Our goal is to contribute \$25,000. Please consider donating to the reason why we're here and help support our parent organization in helping them.

MENTORING AND MEMBERSHIP: We are almost half-way through this year's 2020-2021 term and we are lagging behind in membership. Regional Membership Revitalization calls are being set up to follow the Regional Mentoring sessions set up by Committee Chairman PDC Bob Phillips, Jr. Our first Mentoring/Membership date was Saturday, January 18, 2020 at Pemberton Post 294. The Mentoring session was from 10 am to 12 pm, followed by the Membership Revitalization Calls Session from 12 to 1. I look forward to helping individuals needing help and those squadrons who need assistance with their membership. If possible, I would like us to go out to lunch together afterwards.

VETERAN AFFAIRS: Committee Chairman PDC Pat Gallagher has reported that the last Detachment Veteran's Affairs event was Saturday, January 25 at Menlo Park.

Murray-Troutt Post and Squadron 262 Flag Retirement Ceremony on February 22.

The Murray-Troutt American Legion Post and Squadron 262 were contacted by Ms. Joyce Miller of the Volunteers of America, Delaware Valley. Ms. Miller is the Veterans Services Coordinator for Home of the Brave. She asked if the Veteran Service Organization would be available to conduct a flag retirement and replacement of ceremony at their location in Camden NJ. The current US Flag, POW-MIA Flag and State of New Jersey Flag had succumbed to the outside elements and needed to be replaced.

A dual member of 262, Post Commander and Squadron Adjutant Doug Catts advised his fellow Legionnaires and Squadron Comrades of the request. Past Detachment Commander, ANEC and Squadron Commander Robert Phillips Jr. and Doug formed a detail of members from the Post family.

The flag retirement and replacement of the United States Flag, the POW-MIA Flag and State Of New Jersey Flag was conducted on February 22, 2020 at 1pm.

The ceremony was witnessed by over 100 people from several organizations, both Veteran Service Organizations and non VSO groups. The Legion Riders of 281, Dual Legion members from Post/Sq. 68, 286, 262, and 311 were on hand to assist with the raising of the 3 flags. A non-VSO group, Rolling Badges MC of Westville NJ, were in attendance as well. The motorcycle club is made up of police, fire, and EMS professionals and many of them are veterans.

As those in attendance moved forward to bear witness to the flag retirement, 20 veterans from the Home of the Brave were in the front of the ranks and stood at attention as the flags were lowered, replaced, and reflown.

After the flags were secured, Post Chaplain George Cain came forward and offered a special prayer for the retired flags as well as a prayer for four residents of Home of the Brave who had passed away this past year.

Home of the Brave is part of the Volunteers of America Delaware Valley Homeless Shelter in Camden NJ. The veterans who currently reside here are transitioning from the shelter to more permanent housing in the Delaware Valley.

19 SEPTEMBER 2020 – BELLEVILLE, NJ – On Saturday 19 September-2020, American Legion Post 105 and Sons of The American Legion (SAL) Squadron 105 in Belleville held their annual picnic in the parking lot behind the Post, under clear blue skies, which ended up being the largest picnic in Post 105 history. SAL Squadron 105 of Belleville ran a fundraiser in December which donated \$500 to the Fisher House Foundation, an organization which provides Veterans housing on-site at VA medical facilities.

A 50/50 raffle ran for two weeks. The SAL sold \$1,000 worth of tickets with the winner being picked at the Post 105 Christmas Party on 21 December 2019. The winner of the raffle was Post 105 Legionnaire Tommy D'Angelis, with the other half going directly to the charity.

The SAL picked this as a charity to raise money for because it directly impacts not only veterans, but their families. The Fisher House Foundation builds comfort homes where military & veteran's families can stay free of charge, while a loved one is in the hospital. These homes are located at military and VA medical centers around the world.

Fisher Houses have up to 21 suites, with private bedrooms and baths. Families share a common kitchen, laundry facilities, a warm dining room, and an inviting living room. Since inception, the program has saved military and veterans' families an estimated \$451 million in out of pocket costs for lodging and transportation.

Throughout the year, in coordination with its parent organization The American Legion, the SAL runs various fundraisers benefiting both the local Legion Post in Belleville, The American Legion on a State and National scale, and other national and international charities.
