#### THE S.A.L.

The Sons of the American Legion is the largest, self sufficient program of the American Legion. During the 1930's in the midst of the Great Depression, the SAL came into being and was almost laid to rest by two wars.

The idea of a junior American Legion organization was first discussed at the 1922 National Convention, but WWI veterans had not begun their families yet so the idea was tabled. By the late 1920's, Legion posts around the country started to enroll Sons of Legionnaires in junior organizations on their own. They were known by various names--the Junior Legion, Legion-Heirs, Sons of World War Veterans, Sons of American Legionnaires.

At the 1930 National Convention, a committee was created to study the feasibility of a junior program. Then at the 1932 National Convention, the Sons was established a a nonprofit, nonsectarian civilian organization. In 1933 the American Legion officially named it The Sons of the American Legion and authorized its official abbreviation S. A. L. Dues were set at 25 cents.

By the late 1930's, the S. A. L. had over 70,000 members. Then WWII broke out and many Sons marched off to war. Some never returned. Those on the home front worked in Civil Defense, Aircraft warning posts, defense plants, and helped with war bond drives.

When Sons returned from WWII, they found that their military service made them eligible for the American Legion and joined it instead. As the ranks of the American Legion swelled between 1946 and 1956, S.A.L. ranks dwindled to fewer than 6,000 members.

Because of the efforts of dedicated Legion Family members, the S.A.L. made a remarkable turn around. By 1958 they numbered more than 10,000 members. In 1963 national dues were raised to 50 cents and military sounding officer titles were removed.

1972 was an important year. It was then that the Legion's National Executive Committee approved the creation of a National S.A.L. Organization under the full supervision and control of the Legion's N.E.C. Because of this action the S.A.L. was able to hold its first national convention. In August, 1972, in Chicago, the 1972 Convention elected its first national commander, Robert Faust of California.

Over the years the Sons have created six national commissions for the purpose of coordinating activities of various committees. They also established Squadron Americanism Awards (1993), Scholastic Awards for Boys Nation and Junior Shooting Sports (1994), and the S.A.L. Color Guard Award again (1996).

1996 was the year S.A.L. members nationally contributed more than \$116,000.00 to the American Legion's Child Welfare Foundation, making them the largest contributor to the Foundation that year. Ten years later they broke the 300,000 membership mark. Your Detachment of New Jersey and its member squadrons are an asset to Legion posts and should be utilized and praised your dedication to service of veterans and their families. Accomplishments include sponsoring boys to the Boys State Program and girls to Girls State, helping with the Coloring Contest, Poster Contest, Oratorical Contest, and sponsoring a scholarship annually.

Legionnaires should become more aware of what Sons do. You can find some really dedicated, extremely hard working men there. Oh, don't forget that Son might just be a Legionnaire as well! Many Legionnaires are dual members still carrying their S. A. L. memberships cards because their parents, grandparents, even great-grandparents either were or still are war- time veterans.

I hope posts nurture their members and allow them to grow because if they underutilize them, the squadrons will wilt away to nothing.
