Dear Comrades:

It seems only yesterday that I became involved in the Sons of the American Legion. That was back in '93. I had been a member almost my whole life but did not attend meetings until I could sit still and be quiet. My older brother Ed had become involved the year prior when my father was state commander. I wanted to be involved too.

As things would have it, the detachment chaplain resigned. No one else was around to take the job so I did. I began going to Locustwood, High Point, VA&R homes, Legion College, NEC's, national conventions, and so much more. I learned by experience; I trained by doing. I sat in every Executive Board office except NEC and ANEC (offices past commanders historically take) over eleven years.

When the Detachment Commander could not fulfill his duties at the end of '98, I was chosen by the Commander's Advisory to take over pro tem. That temporary position lasted until Wildwood the following June. Most people expected me to run for commander then. However, I looked at things and decided for myself, by myself, I was not the best man for the job. My brother Ed had been unsuccessful candidate in 1998. I took over for the man he lost to; therefore, I deferred to Ed. He ran and became detachment commander not once but twice. Both he and I made the right choices for the SAL and ourselves.

While Ed was still in office, I decided that I would not attempt to follow him. There are always comparisons, and I knew that I wanted to be known for my accomplishments, not for being the little *bother*. I chose to wait until 2002. That's when I threw in my fore and aft, campaigned, and swore my oath of office. Those who supported me did the lion's share. I could never have done it alone.

The committees and chairs I selected accomplished much. This year brought a rise in membership, new squadrons, reactivated squadrons, a new county, a commander's project that helped CMN kids like my own nephew, and the highest CWF donations ever. (Thanks, Mike.) Detachment, adding Veterans Haven to Lyons, Menlo Park, Paramus, Vineland and East Orange, expanded its commitment to vets. I got to be a delegate at Boys State; I even got to visit Girls State.

Along the line many good people helped--the Executive Board, members, and, of course, my dad. I'll remember them always. I want especially to recognize my father, Tom Marsden, for all he has done over the years. He was my teacher and role model. His example guided me.

I mourn the death of my Judge Advocate, PDC Ray Miller. He loved and breathed the Sons. He was a good, dedicated man. I miss him and his wisdom. I think of him often and hope he's smiling. He once gave tribute to my family's work in the SAL praising the service of my father and his two sons. I never got the chance to thank him for all he did for the Duke. Sometimes, just sometimes, words do fail me.

I have a picture of Ernie Wilson taped to my desk. He was my idol, my inspiration. I often wonder what he would think. He brought New Jersey so far. He had so many plans for its future. My commander's pin commemorates him--he loved his country and the SAL. Its eagle represents his looking over this year, my year.

Our Legionnaires led by Cmdr. Billy are fantastic. Our Sons are unbelievable. Our Ladies are the best ever. National Auxiliary President, our own Elsie Bailey, truly is a great lady; National Vice Commander East, Laurel Mathews, another mother to me; NEC Sue Griffiths, a gracious, dedicated shining star; and Department Auxiliary President Maggie McMahon, beside me at official events, a friend.

As I leave office, I carry good memories and good feelings away. It was fun helping the children and vets. Thank you for your support and best wishes.
