LEGIONNAIRES OFFERED ASSISTANCE

Members of the nation's largest veterans organization impacted by Hurricane Katrina can now apply directly to national headquarters for immediate relief cash grants from the National Emergency Fund (NEF).

Legionnaires can apply to receive up to \$1,500 to cover costs of food, shelter and clothing needed as the result of devastation created by the nation's largest national disaster that affected several Gulf Coast states.

A cash grant will be immediately placed in the member's credit card account upon approval to cover costs created by displacement from the storm. If the individual does not have a credit card, funds can be transferred direct to the hotel/motel to cover the cost of lodging.

"We want all Legionnaires to know that help is just a toll free call away," said National Commander Thomas L. Bock. "Our goal is rapid processing of each application to get money into the hands of our members and their families within a matter of hours."

Legionnaires can call toll-free 1-800-433-3318 to apply by phone. Another option for those with computer access is secure online application at www.legion.org.

The American Legion National Emergency Fund was established in 1969 in the wake of Hurricane Camille. Established by Legionnaires to provide relief to Legionnaires impacted by natural disasters, the fund has provided assistance to thousands of members.

"Given the massive scale of this disaster, I ask that all Legionnaires who have not been affected by Katrina consider donating now to the NEF," Bock said. "Our thoughts and prayers go out to all Americans suffering in the aftermath of this devastating hurricane. It is imperative that we contribute whatever we can to help them through this very difficult time."

BEACH "WATCHFIRE" HONORS POWS-MIAS

SEASIDE HEIGHTS--The annual 12-hour "watchfire" tended by the Sons of the American Legion burned throughout the night in a hole on the Hiering Avenue beach in remembrance of those who were declared prisoners of war and those missing in action. The Watchfire followed a week of nationwide events aimed at recognizing POWs and MIAs.

The flames were also used to respectfully retire 8,000 old and tattered American flags.

Lukasz Marsden, 20, of Brick came home for the event from the Naval Air Station North Island in San Diego, where he is learning to repair helicopters in his role as a naval airman. Paying his respects, Marsden was one of about 132 people, including military, veterans, family, and friends of veterans, who stopped by at the 12-hour Watchfire, which burned Friday evening into Saturday.

The traditional POW/MIA empty seat and table setting signifying the missing was aglow from the firelight. The third Friday of September is nationally dedicated as the official day to remember POWs and MIAs. The annual Watchfire held by the state's Sons of the American Legion has been moved over the years, but the purpose remains the same: "Never forget."

That idea is comforting to Marsden, who said he doesn't mind sounding like a commercial for joining the armed services.

His dad, Tom Marsden, is a member of the Sons of the American Legion and has organized the annual event for more than a decade. At midnight, the flags were retired in a special ceremony after being collected over the past year.

The Watchfire spans generations for the Marsdens. Though Tom Marsden is not a veteran, he won't pass up the opportunity to pay homage to those who have and will put themselves in harm's way for their country, he said.

Lukasz Marsden's mother, Pat Marsden, said she could not imagine life if her child were to be lost and left behind enemy lines. She feels the same for all families who would suffer such a loss whether in this war or past wars.

Tom Engkilterra of Kenilworth, a regional coordinator for the National League of Families of American Prisoners, was also at the event.
