Homeland Security Update

Winter storms can range from a moderate snow over a few hours to a blizzard with blinding, wind-driven snow that lasts for several days. Some winter storms are large enough to affect several states, while others affect only a single community. Many winter storms are accompanied by dangerously low temperatures and sometimes by strong winds, icing, sleet and freezing rain.

Regardless of the severity of a winter storm, you should be prepared in order to remain safe during these events.

Know the Difference

Winter Storm Outlook -

Winter storm conditions are possible in the next 2 to 5 days.

Winter Weather Advisory -

Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening.

Winter Storm Watch - Winter

storm conditions are possible within the next 36 to 48 hours. People in a watch area should review their winter storm plans and stay informed about weather conditions.

Winter Storm Warning - Life-threatening, severe winter conditions have begun or will begin within 24 hours. People in a warning area should take precautions immediately.

To prepare for a winter storm you should do the following:

Before winter approaches, add the following supplies to your emergency kit:

Rock salt or more environmentally safe products to melt ice on walkways.

Sand to improve traction.

Snow shovels and other snow removal equipment.

Sufficient heating fuel. You may become isolated in your home and regular fuel sources may be cut off. Store a good supply of dry, seasoned wood for your fireplace or wood-burning stove.

Adequate clothing and blankets

to keep you warm.

Make a Family Communications Plan. Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so it is important to know how you will contact one another, how you will get back together and what you will do in case of an emergency. Listen to a National Weather Radio or other local news channels for critical information from the National Weather Service. Be alert to changing weather conditions.

Minimize travel. If travel is necessary, keep a disaster supplies kit in your vehicle.

Bring pets/companion animals inside during winter weather. Move other animals or livestock to sheltered areas with non-frozen drinking water.

A simple check list, would be a great way to know that you have all the items needed to survive Winter Storms.

Honor Flight Experience

According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, an estimated 640 WWII veterans die each day. Honor Flight Network is dedicated to Transport America's veterans to Washington, D.C. to visit those memorials dedicated to honor their service and sacrifices.

Since America felt it was important to build a memorial to the service and the ultimate sacrifice of her veterans, the Honor Flight Network believes it is equally important that they actually get to visit and experience THEIR memorial. Top priority is given to America's most senior heroes — survivors of World War II and any veteran with a terminal illness who wishes to visit THEIR memorial.

Commander Amel Balega and PDC Lenny Free had the honor of escorting 2 such heroes to the WWII memorial wall on November 2, 2013. Our journey began in Totowa, NJ at 6 am, where we joined up with Huey Verelli, a small business owner from Woodland park that served the army during the Battle of the Bulge, and Jack Bandebian, a merchant marine from West Milford who served in WWII and is a cancer patient who is still receiving Chemo. First, we traveled the lengthy trip to the Courtyard Marriott in Philadelphia. Once there we boarded 7 buses, each filled with veterans and guardians, for the next leg of our adventure to Washington DC.

The first stop was the Arlington Cemetery

to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier where they witnessed the changing of the guard. Over the next 2 days we saw the sites of our nation's capital, listened to old war stories and bonded with these two men. The way our veterans had been treated and received was an emotional and heartwarming experience that cannot be described easily. At one point I had noticed red blotches on their faces and feared they were having an allergic reaction to something. Later we learned it was lipstick from the kisses they had received.

During the return trip, our 7 buses were escorted up the highway by 160 motorcycles. Each overpass held a pair of fire trucks with crossed ladders and a service man honoring our heroes with flags held high. Our veterans could hardly believe all this was done for them. All participants received a T-shirt, cap, jacket, and other mementos provided by the Honor Flight Network. We ended our trip in Philadelphia where they received a red carpet welcome complete with crowds of grateful citizens, an honor guard, dinner and a USO style performance from the Manhattan Dolls.

In another 5-7 years almost all of our World War II veterans will be gone. This tour is their "last hurrah" - the last time they will

be recognized as the conquering victors that collectively and literally saved the world. The average cost to make this dream a reality is \$225 per veteran and is provided directly through donations and contributions to the Honor flight program. The experience is priceless.

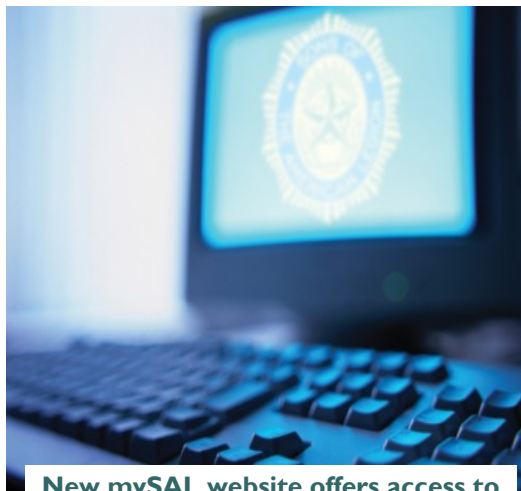

mySAL.org launches with tools to assist Squadrons



New mySAL website offers access to membership tools.

The SAL is entering a new age of technology.

This Fall National Headquarters has developed the "NEW" **mySAL.org** website to mimic **myLegion.org**, which assists posts, district and county officers with membership needs.

The **mySAL.org** website is a secure internet site linked to the membership data base for the Sons of the American Legion. The portal site

provides officers with access to membership data and member - management tools.

Squadron adjutants or a designated representative can view and edit member information for his squadron.

This includes making changes to names, addresses, and date of birth. The adjutant can create reports available in CSV file format which will allow users to work with data in Microsoft Excel and Access. These programs can be used to generate mailing labels and delists for paid and unpaid members. If used properly, this can be a great and powerful membership tool and can greatly assist in membership renewals.

To get started, just go to www.legion.org/sons and CLICK on the **mysal** link. Complete the authorization form and collect the proper authorized signatures from the squadron and you are on your way.

This is a free service, which over 106 squadrons to date have already registered for. Only one person per squadron may be authorized. Keep in mind this person must be a member of the sons with current membership dues paid.

National Commander's Project: Legacy Scholarship

The Legacy Scholarship fund was established in 2001 to fill the scholarship gap for children of Soldiers killed on or after September 11, 2001.

The American Legion has established a goal of raising \$20 million

to fund this cause.

Currently there are over 6,000 children that may someday need the Legacy Scholarship.

A Night to Remember: 23rd Annual SAL Watch Fire

On September 20-21 the Detachment of New Jersey's Sons of the American Legion joined together with representatives from the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary for the 23rd Annual Watch Fire in Seaside Heights.

It was a night of solemn vigil for those men and women who had gone to serve our country and never returned. They are our brothers and sisters, mothers and fathers, sons and daughters; they are Our POW's and MIA's and they are not forgotten. Over 78,000 soldiers are still unaccounted for from WWII, more than 8,000 still missing from the Korean War, 1,855 from Vietnam, 120 from the Cold war, and the fight to bring Bo Bergdahl home still continues. These are the people we honor each year. As long as there is one soldier unaccounted for; we as a nation will never give up or forget.

The event began with the color guard presentation, the empty chair dedication and the setting of the empty table; guest speakers, stories and songs were shared from dusk till dawn. The recent fire which ravaged several

blocks of an already devastated boardwalk prevented the traditional bon-fire usually present at our watch fires and was replaced with a searchlight which burned all night long followed by a hot breakfast on the beach.

On Sept 21st the detachment traveled down to Wildwood where the Auxiliary held its service for POW's and MIA's. They shared the importance to remain vigilant and pray for those who have not yet returned home.

They are selected to attend Boys State by their local American Legion Post based on their leadership and character. They then form a mythical state of Magnolia, where they are divided into groups of cities and countries.

The detachment of New Jersey sent two boys to the national Boys State held in Washington DC this year, one boy; Zachary Bourgeois, from Camden County, and the other; Andrew Ziccardi, from Cape May. PDC Patrick Gallagher had the chance to meet with both boys, who expressed their excitement to be part of the program.

If your squadron is able to sponsor a boy to Boy State or young lady to Girls State, please do. It's a great program that they will never forget. The cost to send one boy is \$250.00; which is not a great amount considering all it includes. If your Post, Squadron or Unit is not able to sponsor a child, you may solicit finds from an outside group (a local business, the Elks, etc...).

The Boys State committee is trying to push the number of boys at boy's state this year to 1000 boys. Last year's count was 960 boys. If we pull together we can do it. There is more information on the national website about "What is Boys State" as well as numerous videos on YouTube regarding the subject.

High Point Memorial Service

What started off as an overcast day did not deter the men and women of the American Legion to gather together at High Point monument in High point NJ to pay tribute to the soldiers who had lain down their lives for our great country.

The Monument on High Point was built by Kuser to honor war veterans. Master mason Michael Maddaluna began construction of the 220 foot (67 m) tower - which has a base which is 34 square feet (3.2 m²) - in 1928 and completed it in 1930. The outside is made of New Hampshire granite and also Shawan-gunk quartz. There are four small windows through which observers have a view of the ridges of the Pocono Mountains toward the west, the Catskill Mountains to the north and the Wallkill River Valley in the southeast.

The Monument is an obelisk monument similar to other war monuments, such as the one on Bunker Hill in Massachusetts.

Contingents of color guards stood poised in the rain before marching up the hill to the monument.

Each year the American Legion, Sons of the American Legion and Auxiliary hold a memorial service at the monument where wreaths were presented by the newly elected Department Commander, James Amos, Department Auxiliary President Char McConville and Detachment Commander Amel Balega.
