

HOW RECIPIENTS BENEFIT

Today, wounded wantors need a variety of items to help in their necovery. Some patients require loose-fitting sweatsuits to cover their healing wounds without adding pressure to burns sustained in combat. Others use fitness equipment to rebuild strength in their muscles. Still others enjoy the camaraderie and fresh air that come from a fishing trip, thenks to donated gear.

Some gifts have included sports equipment for the adaptive therapy program at Fort Jackson, gift cards to patients at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, and fahing and kayak gear at Fort Drum.

The success of the program relies entirely on donations, which are used to purchase items for U.S. servicemembers.

OPERATION COMFORT WARRIORS

As the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan have drawn to a close, many servicemembers left the battlefeld only to be faced with a new fight; a struggle to overcome the mental and physical wounds suffered during deployment. Those with traumatic brain injury (TBI) or post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) seturned home in unprecedented numbers in fact, the Army has estimated that up to 20 percent of the men and women who served in Afghanistan or Iraq have suffered a TBI.

Even when not at war, those in the military still face inherent dangers during training exercises and while performing other hazardous duties.

While the care at military hospitals and warior transition units is extraordinary. The Ameican Legion's Operation Comfort Warriors
(OCW) program was created to provide "nonessentials" - items that help wounded warriors
in their recovery but don't usually show up as a
budget line on government spreadsheets.
OCW is not a program designed to help with
bits (mortigage, rent, utilities or credit cards),
car repairs or home repairs.

HOW TO HELP

Most military medical centers are not equipped to store large quantities of care packages. The Legion strongly prefers monetary donations so that it can expedite the purchase and delivery of items to servicemembers.

HOW TO GIVE: Visit legion.org/ocw/to donate electronically, using your credit card. Checks may be mailed to The American Legion, Operation Comfort Warriors, PO Box 361626, Indianapolis, IN 46236.

HOW TO RAISE MONEY: A fundraiser such as a motoecycle run or a fish fry can be a great way to gather donastons. A Legion post, Auxiliary unit, Sons of The American Legion squadron, Legion Riders chapter, church group or other charitable organization could assist in sponsoring a fundraiser. Proceeds from a fundraising event can be donated to OCW via the website or making address listed above.

HOW IT WORKS

The American Legion is contacted by individuals. VA hospitals, warrior transition centers and communities with needs for wounded, injured, disabled or III service-members. Once a need is identified, the items are ordered by the Legion and delivered in an expeditious manner. It's as simple as that. No red tape.

All of OCWs administrative and marketing costs are paid from Legion membership dues, meaning that 100 percent of donated funds go directly to purchasing comfort items for the



American Legion Post 331 Annual Fund Raiser Supports Veterans Transitional Housing Program

(17Sep2023)Each year, Stone Harbor's American Legion Post 331 and its Sons of The American Legion (S.A.L.) Squadron, supported by the Yacht Club of Stone Harbor, host a spaghetti dinner fund raiser for a designated veterans' charity. This year's charity was Veterans Haven South of Winslow, New Jersey, a veterans transitional housing program operated by the New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans Affairs for homeless veterans. After being medically evaluated at a VA Medical Center, eligible

veterans must agree to a long-term program focusing on psychological, social, and vocational rehabilitation. Legion and S.A.L. members with support from cadets from the Middle Township High School Navy National Defense Cadet Corps served 263 meals throughout the evening. At the end of the dinner, a donation of \$5,000 was presented to Brigadier General (BG) Patrick Kennedy, superintendent of Veterans Haven South, by co-hosts Jon Ready, Post 331 Trustee, and Reese Moore, acting S.A.L. commander. Previously, Post 331 had donated \$17,500 to the Veterans Haven South program.

Among items mentioned, the Children's Welfare Foundation (CWF), probably the largest fundraising effort of the SAL, is close to have donated **\$10 MILLION DOLLARS** over the years. There is \$309,000 to go to reach that milestone, in hopes to reach it by the New Orleans Convention next year.

As of September 28, \$103,000 has been donated by the SAL, a \$25,000 increase over the previous year. Thirty-seven Detachments donated this amount. The \$10M goal is in sight and the Sons were encouraged to keep up the good work with donations. Young Henry P. Hasselhan, 7-year-old Son of Atco Squadron 311 and grandson of PDC Henry F. Hasselhan, was mentioned several times for the \$2500 he has personally raised for CWF. If every member of every NJ Squadron donated \$1, almost \$10,000 could be realized for CWF.

(As of the last Membership Report, NJ SAL Membership stands at 9,819, just 181 away from 10,000)

In 1952, Dr. Garland D. Murphy Jr. gave to The American Legion a large contribution that would benefit children. The Legion and Murphy entered into a trust agreement that established the Child Welfare Foundation, approved by the National Executive Committee on Oct. 15, 1953.

Established in 1954, The American Legion Child Welfare Foundation was developed as a repository of funds from individuals who wished to contribute to the betterment of children in this country. Our foremost philanthropic priority is to contribute to the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual welfare of children and youth by aiding progress in the field of child welfare through dissemination of knowledge about research, studies, surveys, projects, or by supporting programs and activities benefiting the welfare of children and youth.

Not all American children grow up inside the comfortable definition of normal childhood development. For thousands, each day is a challenge marked by pain, prayer and perseverance. 

SPAM

Spam is a brand of canned cooked meat made by Hormel Foods Corporation. It was first introduced in 1937 and gained popularity worldwide after its use during World War II. By 2003, Spam was sold in 41 countries on six continents and trademarked in over 100 countries (except in the Middle East and North Africa). In 2007, the seven billionth can of Spam was sold.



HISTORY

Spam was introduced by Hormel in 1937. Ken Daigneau, brother of a company executive, won a \$100 prize that year in a competition to name the new item. Hormel claims that the meaning of the name "is known by only a small circle of former Hormel Foods executives", but popular beliefs are that the name is an abbreviation of "spiced ham", "spare meat", or "shoulders of pork and ham". Another popular explanation is that Spam is an acronym standing for "Specially Processed American Meat" or "Specially Processed Army Meat".

The difficulty of delivering fresh meat to the front during World War II saw Spam become a ubiquitous part of the U.S. soldier's diet. It became variously referred to as "ham that didn't pass its physical", "meatloaf without basic training", and "Special Army Meat". Over 150 million pounds of Spam were purchased by the military before the war's end.

During World War II and the occupations which followed, Spam was introduced into Guam, Hawaii, Okinawa, the Philippines, and other islands in the Pacific. Immediately absorbed into native diets, it has become a unique part of the history and effects of U.S. influence in the Pacific.

As a consequence of World War II rationing and the Lend-Lease Act, Spam also gained prominence in the United Kingdom. British prime minister during the 1980s Margaret Thatcher later referred to it as a "wartime delicacy". In addition to increasing production for the U.K., Hormel expanded Spam output as part of Allied aid to the similarly beleaguered Soviet Union. Nikita Khrushchev declared: "Without Spam we wouldn't have been able to feed our army". Throughout the war, countries ravaged by the conflict and faced with strict food rations came to appreciate Spam
