Decorating the graves this year for Memorial Day? Please tally the flags placed and let NEC Bob Phillips know at <u>bpjrsal@gmail.com</u> Don't forget pictures for *The SALute*. The Flying Flags for Heroes project is still ongoing. "One Million Flags placed on Veteran graves throughout the USA!"

In a related story, flags placed at Mount Prospect Cemetery in Neptune by SAL 346 members were missing from Veterans' graves. Only about 25 or so, these were mysteriously removed from the same graves as the year before. *SALute* Editor and SAL Sq 346 Commander Gary Crawford appeared on News12NJ and in other media outlets to show the vandalism. After investigation by Neptune Twp Police and others, the possibility that four-legged residents of the cemetery may have had a hand – or paw - in the crime. A fox den was spotted nearby, and the cemetery is also home to ground hogs, squirrels, chipmunks, deer, and other critters, so the theft of the flags may be animal-related, but the clean removal of the flags from the wooden sticks still seems suspicious. The jury is still out on the cause of the missing flags. If nothing else, the publicity helped to remind the public of what Memorial Day is all about.

At the 2022 SAL Spring Meetings, SAL Child Welfare Foundation Committee chairman Mark Nave praised the SAL for reaching \$9 million in donations to CWF and set the next goal.

"We're 'fine at nine,' but now it's time to reach 'the perfect 10,'" he said.

Mission accomplished!

The SAL this month reached **\$10 million** in donations to CWF since 1988, continuing as the program's largest donor.

SAL National Commander Don "JR" Hall broke the news with a post on his personal Facebook page: "How about them Sons!!!"

"We had a goal to raise \$407,000 this year to reach the \$10 million mark for the years of work," Hall wrote. "Congrats to all of our membership that has had fundraisers, bought CWF merchandise and worked hard to get to and exceed the goal."

Hall added, "Thanks to every blue cap member that made donations over the years."

The CWF program year officially runs through May 31, so final donation numbers aren't known yet. Departments, posts, detachments, and squadrons that donate and want to receive credit for the 2023-2024 program year should ensure all donations are received at American Legion National Headquarters no later than Friday, May 31. Donations also can be made online at legion.org/donate. Donations support grants to youth-serving nonprofits that contribute to the physical, mental, emotional and spiritual welfare of children.



From ALA National:

We have a special request from one of our overseas commissaries: They need coupons!

This is a great opportunity to get members involved in working the mission of National Security, especially those members who may be homebound.

Below are some helpful tips and the contact information on where to send the coupons:

1. Only Manufacturer's Coupons may be used. This can include coupons for food, non-food items like hygiene or cleaning supplies, baby items such as diapers, and pet supplies. The commissary is unable to accept store coupons, restaurant coupons or internet coupons.

2. Cut out the coupons. Please do not send sheets of unclipped coupons.

3. Overseas Commissaries are permitted to accept expired manufacturer coupons up to 6 months past the expiration date. Be sure to consider the time it will take to mail the coupons and for the commissary to sort.

4. Try and sort the coupons before mailing: separate the expired (or soon to expire) from the non-expired. Then separate and group together by type: Food, Non-food, baby & children, and pets.

5. Send the coupons to the below address: Yokosuka Commissary PSC 473 BOX 33 FPO AP 96349

In Memoriam: *Lou Conter*, the last survivor of the Battleship Arizona at Pearl Harbor:

Louis Anthony Conter (September 13, 1921 – April 1, 2024) was an American naval officer who was a lieutenant commander and naval aviator in the United States Navy. At the time of his death, he was the last living survivor of the sinking of the USS *Arizona* during the attack on Pearl Harbor.

The *Arizona* sank in nine minutes, taking the lives of 1,177 of her crew. Her 334 surviving crew struggled to escape the burning ruins, of which Conter saved several by pulling them out of the water into his lifeboat before rowing to shore. Following the attack, Conter spent several weeks helping to put out fires and recovering the bodies of the fallen.

After his retirement from the Navy, Conter pursued a career as a real estate developer in California. Conter published a book about his life titled *The Lou Conter Story* in 2021; he turned 100 the same year. Conter was also a member of the Knights of Columbus. Following the death of Ken Potts in April 2023, Conter became the last known survivor of the sinking of the USS *Arizona*. He died from congestive heart failure at his home in Grass Valley, California, on April 1, 2024, at the age of 102.

The artillery shells that churned up the soil and maimed and killed soldiers in World War One, brought not only Clostridia, the deadly bacteria to the surface, but also encouraged the proliferation and growth of the dormant poppy seeds that later in their beauty, bloomed in profusion on the barren, scarred land, even in the cemeteries

Across northern France and Flanders (northern Belgium), the brutal clashes between Allied and Central Powers soldiers tore up fields and forests, tearing up trees and plants and wreaking havoc on the soil beneath. But in the warm early spring of 1915, bright red flowers began peeking through the battle-scarred land: Papaver rhoeas, known variously as the Flanders poppy, corn poppy, red poppy and corn rose.

According to Marc Eliot's 2005 Cary Grant biography:

After playing small parts in the first five Marx Brothers movies, Herbert (Zeppo) felt his talent wasn't being used to its full extent and left the act to join Milton (Gummo) as an agent. Zeppo had great mechanical skills and was largely responsible for keeping the Marx family car running. He later owned a company that machined parts for the war effort during World War II, Marman Products Co. of Inglewood, California, later known as the Aeroquip Company. This company produced a motorcycle, called the **Marman Twin**, and the **Marman clamps** used to hold the "Fat Man" atomic bomb inside the B-29 bomber Bockscar. He invented and obtained several patents for a wristwatch that monitored the pulse rate of cardiac patients and gave off an alarm if the heartbeat became irregular, and a therapeutic pad for delivering moist heat to a patient.

A Discovery in Bordentown:



We often like to remind you that Bordentown has a rich history, if you just look for it. However, we did not expect to find this World War II era machine gun bullet while digging gravel near the railroad line in Bordentown!

It's no April Fool, this is a genuine .50 caliber shell that likely fell from a freight car while being transported along the Camden and Amboy railroad and over the decades was buried by gravel.

Its markings indicate that it was made at an ammunition plant in St Louis, MO, and was likely on its way to the South Amboy terminus, the only terminal of the Port of New York and New Jersey that allowed the unloading of large quantities of commercial explosives from freight cars.

From South Amboy, crates of ammunition were loaded onto barges in Raritan Bay, headed for military bases across the country. Once again reminding us how vital the railroad has been in our country's history.

Found not far from the Bordentown City Veteran's Memorial, it is also a sobering reminder of the sacrifices veterans over the years have made for our freedoms. Today in particular, marks 79 years since the start of the Battle of Okinawa, the bloodiest battle of the Pacific War and the last major battle of World War II.

Today and every day, we thank our veterans for their service - the world would be a very different place without their courage, strength and dedication to keeping us safe.


